COURSE OVERVIEW

Welcome to **COM340: Exploring Women's Sports**. This is a unique class in that will use both journalistic and anthropological lenses through which to look women's sports – how they are played, how they fit into different societies and, ultimately, how they are both covered in mainstream media and consumed by mainstream audiences.

It is also unique, as you know, in that it will culminate with a trip to one of the globe's biggest international sporting events – the FIFA World Cup – in Sydney, Australia this summer. (We're going to freaking Australia!)

Given that it is a special class, we will take a special approach to how teach it and how you learn in it.

Students will ultimately work in pairs to become experts on the following nations: Australia, Colombia, Denmark, England, Germany, South Korea and another yet-to-be-determined country. (These are the countries we will see compete while we are in Sydney. While we will not see Australia play, we will be in the host nation, which is why it is included.)

Among the areas you will be expected to master are: historic and modern context of football, the situation of women/girls in sports (focus on football), the rights of women/girls/racial and sexual minorities, racism/other forms of discrimination in the country, media overall and sports media environment in the country. Obviously, the latter will have much to do with the government and politics, as well.

As you master that information, Professors Haldane and Yanity will introduce you to academic concepts such as capitalism and hegemony, while directing you to scholarly and popular readings as well as leading discussions to inform your knowledge base on FIFA, football federations and World Cup-qualifying tournaments, sport media practices, coverage of women's sport, political issues in the host nations and more.

Class lectures, discussions and screenings will add complexity and keep the course upto-date with current trends and issues in the media industries that pop up throughout the semester. Thus, attendance is mandatory and participation is extremely important.

The classroom is your "workplace" while you are in college. Thus, you should treat it the same way you would treat work attendance. You may miss **TWO class meetings, no questions asked** without penalty – consider these your "sick/personal days." After two absences, unless you have a <u>documented</u> excuse for missing those additional class meetings (ex: serious illness, family emergency, doctor-mandated quarantine, etc.), your class participation grade will drop 5 percent per absence.

- You need to come to class prepared. This means you have done the reading, prepared questions and discussion points.
